November 11 Meeting



Denise Brown

At our November 11 dinner meeting, we welcomed guest speaker **Denise Brown**, Regional Director for the Pennsylvania Office for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing (ODHH). Denise has been deaf since birth, and was assisted by American Sign Language (ASL) interpreter **Cindi Brown**. Denise was born ad raised on the south side of Allentown. She attended Gallaudet University in Washington, DC, where she graduated with a degree in Social Work. After college, she joined the Peace Corps. She eventually earned a degree in Rehabilitation Counseling, and since 1997 has worked for ODHH. There have been numerous technological advancements in the field over the decades. Denise is a native ASL user, so it was difficult for her to read words in caption. Now there is sign language captions available on video. Hearing aids have improved greatly. Most now have Bluetooth capabilities. Old-fashioned TTY's have evolved into video conferencing. Denise recommended that consumers contact their local Centers for Independent Living (CIL's) for information about state-of-the-art products. In 2000, the Lehigh Valley CIL launched the state's first Sign Language Interpreter Referral Service (SLIRS), which provides a directory of qualified ASL interpreters for business, government, and other users. Denise reported that 22-26 million Americans suffer from hearing loss. 60-70% of those are senior citizens. It is the largest category of all reported disabilities. Hearing aid costs have been a barrier fo many seniors on a fixed income. They can cost \$2,000 each. AARP has been lobbying Congress to lower the cost of these and other hearing devices. Another guest at this meeting was **Jerry Latchic**, who was recently fitted with his second cochlear implant. Jerry has lived with severe bilateral hearing loss most of his life. He is very pleased with how well he can now better understand verbal communication with the use of the implants. Denise suggested that we go to www.hearingloss.org for more information about hearing loss and treatment options. And she also mentioned that Google Translation offers voice to text translation, and that Zoom has a captioning option as well. This was a very informative and interactive meeting.

At this meeting, we also welcomed **Kim VanAken**, who is replacing **Jeremy Kappes** as representative of the Lehigh Christian Academy.

100 Years Ago – December 1923

Harry Ives of the Ives Manufacturing Corporation located in Bridgeport, Connecticut, addressed the Club on the "Toy Industry". His address indicated that the toy industry would sell \$85,000,000 worth of toys during the 1923 Christmas season. The **Ives Manufacturing Company** was a toy manufacturer from 1868 to 1932. It was founded by Edward Ives, a descendant of Plymouth colony governor William Bradford, in Plymouth, Connecticut. The company initially produced paper dolls whose limbs moved in response to hot air, but soon began producing a wide range of toys, including a toy cannon that shot using real gunpowder. Ives' later shifted to trains as its designs were copied by other toymakers who were willing to sell them more cheaply. Ives' trains were made of tin or cast iron and initially powered by clockwork, and later electric trains. <u>The company was the largest manufacturer of toy trains in the United States from 1910 until 1924, when Lionel Corporation overtook it</u>

75 Years Ago – December 1948

The Club held a Christmas Party for 600 needy children at the Earle Theater. One of the Kiwanis members provided a Christmas message to the children. After watching a two hour moving picture, Santa Claus distributed candy, fruit and nuts to all the children.

50 Years Ago – December 1973

The Club collected books and games for about forty young children at Casa Guadalupe. In addition, a caravan of Kiwanis member cars chauffeured 25 children to the Emmaus VFW from Casa Guadalupe to see the East Penn Model Railroad Putz. Casa Guadalupe continues to exist in Allentown to provide health, education, and social services for Latino residents of the Lehigh Valley.

25 Years Ago – December 1998

The Club sponsored an Adopt-A-Family service program through the Salvation Army for Christmas to provide families with toys and family needs for families in Allentown. The families received a food basket containing a four-day supply of food. Each child received four toys for Christmas. Over 125 families were served by the Salvation Army program. There is no information on how many of those families were adopted by the Kiwanis Club.
