On December 7, we welcomed 40 guests to our annual Foundation Grant Awards Luncheon, held at the Shanty on 19th. Members of our club and the Kiwanis Clubs of Allentown Northeast, Emmaus, Easton and Palmer Township enjoyed each others company, and a delicious hot buffet served by the Shanty staff. President **Tom Harp** greeted everyone and introduced **Major Santa Correa** of the Salvation Army, who provided the invocation. Following lunch, the Kiwanis Foundation of Allentown President **Todd Siegfried** presented grant checks totalling \$10,000 to 12 local non-profit organizations. Representatives of those organizations provided information about their services, and specifically how the grant money would be used to benefit children and their families. Following this ceremony, President Tom awarded our club's 2023 "Distinguished

A Glance Into Our Past

100 Years Ago - January 1924

The Herbert Paul Lentz American Legion Post No. 29 held an open house on January 24 to honor the Kiwanis Club of Allentown for its efforts to raise funds to furnish the three-year-old facility. The Post was located at 457 Hamilton Street. The City of Allentown had turned the building over to Post, but it stood empty until Kiwanians raised sufficient funds to fully furnish the building. The Post was named for the first resident of Allentown to die in World War I. He died heroically as a result of the torpedoing of the USS destroyer Jacob Jones by a German U-boat. After rescuing three fellow crewmen, Lentz died trying to rescue additional sailors. The Post was relocated to 127 S, 7th Street during the 1930s. The Lehigh County Courthouse is now located at the original Hamilton Street site. The Post apparently closed in the late 1970s due to dwindling membership. The S. 7th Street site was sold in 2004 and converted into apartments.

75 Years Ago – January 1949

The Kiwanis Club of Allentown officially launched its gum ball machine fundraiser. The Ford Gum Ball Company began operations with a 100% connection to the Kiwanis Clubs throughout the United States. When Allentown joined, 1,600 clubs had already been associated with the company. The Kiwanis Clubs across the country used the proceeds to fund their youth community service projects. A total of 250 machines were installed during 1949 and an amazing total of \$1,017 raised during the first year. The effort still continues with roughly a dozen sites with less than \$100 raised each year.

50 Years Ago - January 1974

Allentown mayor Joseph Daddona addressed the Kiwanis Club to outline his plans for the city during 1974. Over \$700,000 of the 1973 budget was committed to existing programs with another \$200,000 needed for new commitments. The city had approximately a \$300,000 surplus moving into 1974. His goals included the implementation of solid waste collection along with recycling, the addition of police and fireman to the existing city forces, implementation of a central office of information and complaints, and revision of traffic regulations to increase right turns on red.

25 Years Ago – January 1999

The Club's January board meeting minutes indicated the treasury had \$7,348.12 in its administrative fund and \$1,346.08 in the youth and community services fund. The Club collected baby food during the month of January to donate as part of Kiwanis's Young Children Priority One program.
