Our March 14 dinner meeting at the Shanty on 19th featured two speakers from Turning Point of the Lehigh Valley, **Dana Zamolyi**, Health Center Coordinator, and **Meghan Baker**, Director of Advancement. Club VP **Karen Baker** served as program chair and introduced the speakers. Turning Point's mission is to eliminate domestic and intimate partner abuse, and to empower the survivor. Since it was founded in 1978, Turning Point has served more than 100,000 victims of domestic abuse. In 2023, a total of 3,480 survivors and their children received services. They also answered 3,447 calls on their 24/7 Helpline. Last year, over 12,000 hours of counseling was provided in person, virtually, and over the phone. Turning Point housed 40 domestic survivors in their Transitional Housing Program. They offer legal services to their clients, and training

programs to organizations in the community. 75% of their funding is from government grants. The balance comes from private donations and special events. They raise money through annual appeals and fundraisers, like their annual Holiday Gift Card Drive. They need volunteers for their Helpline, to act as mentors and "ambassadors," and groups to deliver meals and other tasks. Turning Point provides critical services to victims of domestic abuse. We are interested in building a relationship with them in the year ahead.

Our Foundation provided them with a \$1,000 grant to purchase materials for the mosaic. Details regarding this activity will follow. ## Service Leadership Programs

We are extremely proud and honored to announce that for the first time in decades, our club is sponsoring a <u>new</u> Key Club, at **Lehigh Christian Academy** (LCA) in Allentown! We submitted a petition on behalf of LCA to Kiwanis International, and it was approved

on March 11, 2024. We now have the charter kit and Key Club banner for LCA, and they are in the process of scheduling a chartering ceremony at the school this month. As the sponsoring Kiwanis Club, we will be invited to attend. The LCA Key Club has elected officers, and has already staged a couple of service projects, including the donation of over 1,000 batteries for the homeless population in Allentown, and sending out Easter greeting cards to residents of a local nursing home. **Jeremy Kappes** has volunteered to be the faculty advisor of their Key Club. Congratulations, Lehigh Christian Academy for joining over 1,800 Key Clubs in the Pennsylvania Kiwanis District!

## A Glance Into Our Past

## 100 Years Ago - April 1924

Allentown Mayor Malcolm W, Gross, an honorary member of the Allentown Kiwanis Club, addressed the Club on April 24 with a presentation on the Allentown Park System. Gross served as mayor for 12 years from 1920-1932. Due to health issues, he declined to run in 1931 for a fourth consecutive term. After his recovery, he ran successfully and served four more years from 1936-1940. Mayor Gross worked closely with General Harry Trexler to create the Allentown Park System. His leadership led to the purchase of land to establish the Rose Garden, the Lehigh Parkway, and Cedar Creek Park (the location of our LVCC spring picnic). During his second term, he began the effort to convert General Trexler's summer home, Springwood, in to the Trexler Memorial Park. In 1948, Allentown renamed the Rose Garden to the Malcolm W, Gross Memorial Rose Garden. His son

John "Jack" Gross served as mayor from 1960-64. His grandson Malcolm W. Gross established the highly successful law firm of Gross McGinley & McGinley located on South 7<sup>th</sup> Street.

### 75 Years Ago – April 1949

The second annual Allentown Kiwanis Sports and Hobby Show took place on April 6-10 at the Fair Grounds Grandstand Building. Despite this location being three times the size of the Armory (location of the initial show), all space was sold out for the show. More than 1,000 people attended the opening night which included similar displays and activities as in 1948. A matinee cooking show was added to the second day and a matinee fashion show to the third day to attract women. Chief Crazy Bull, grandson of Chief Sitting Bull, entertained the children during the first day. Over 25,000 people attended the event and the Club raised over \$1,500 for its youth programs.

#### 50 Years Ago - April 1974

The Club's Foundation announced grants to Casa Guadalupe (\$300), Little Le-Hi Trout Nursery (\$500), Fund for Caboose Fire Victims' Families (\$300), Public Health Nurse Library and visual aids (\$2,500), ABE (now Lehigh Valley) Airport Chapel (\$1,500), LARC (now VIA) Building Fund (\$500), and Casa Guadalupe camperships (\$300). The Caboose Bar Fire occurred on March 23, 1974, when a gasoline can was ignited and tossed into the crowded bar located at 128 N 6<sup>th</sup> Street. Nine people were killed and a dozen injured as a result of the fire.
